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Stakeholders' Targeted Consultation EU4Health Annual Work Programme 2026

The EU4Health Programme, adopted in March 2021, is the response to the COVID-19 pandemic and aims to build a strong European Health Union by supporting legislative and non-legislative Union health priorities. Health is a vital investment and the EU4Health programme represents an unprecedented level of EU financial support in the health area, with an initial budget of €5.3 billion for the 2021-27 period, subsequently adjusted to €4.4 billion following the revision of the 2021-2027 Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF).

The European Commission is building a strong European Health Union, in which all EU countries prepare and respond together to health crises, medical supplies are available, affordable and innovative, and countries work together to improve prevention, treatment and aftercare for diseases such as cancer.

This targeted consultation is intended to seek the opinion of stakeholders about current and future Union health priorities and strategic orientations on key health needs to be addressed through the EU4Health Annual Work Programme 2026, providing inputs for reflection on the 2026 programme and beyond. The results will be compiled in a summary stakeholders' consultation report (see the report on the 2025 Work Programme's consultation – link).

*15. What should be the primary focus of the EU4Health programme in 2026?

The EU4Health programme in 2026 should prioritise strengthening health promotion, disease prevention, and action on the wider determinants of health. Despite being mandated, the 20% allocation for health promotion and disease prevention has not been met, leaving essential prevention-oriented activities scattered across different envelopes. A dedicated strand for prevention and health promotion exists under EU4Health, but its allocation does not adequately reflect health promotion and disease prevention needs. Key areas such as health education and communication, physical activity, healthy environments, nutrition, health equity, vaccination, and climate change are either missing or only partially addressed in other strands, often with less emphasis on prevention. At the same time, EU4Health should address health inequalities across Member States, supporting investment where national budgets fall short. Resources must be directed towards building resilient, equitable health systems that prioritise people's long-term health and wellbeing. Greater attention should be given to funding models that enable collaboration between public actors, civil society organisations, and Member States, including the reinstatement of operating grants and fairer allocation of funds for Joint Actions. The programme should strengthen the EU's capacity to address the social and economic drivers of health, recognising that healthier populations are a prerequisite for sustainable competitiveness. Investments in health promotion and reducing inequalities enhance labour market participation, productivity and innovation, while lowering long-term system costs.

*16. From your point of view, what are the major priorities not yet addressed by EU4Health work programmes?

One important opportunity for future EU4Health work programmes is to give stronger attention to the health impact of climate change. While there are already some measures related to vector-borne diseases and surveillance systems, climate and health are not yet treated as a core strategic priority. Expanding this focus would help address the growing risks posed by extreme weather events, air pollution, environmental degradation, and their unequal impacts on vulnerable groups. Environment and climate change should become a central dimension of public health policy. Another area with strong potential is health equity. Although inequalities are mentioned in some actions, they are not consistently integrated as a core pillar. The wider social determinants of health (such as education, income, housing, employment, and environment), commercial determinants (such as alcohol, tobacco and food) as well as environmental determinants also deserve greater funding. These factors have a decisive impact on health outcomes, yet they remain only partially reflected in the programme. A stronger focus on social determinants would improve wellbeing, reduce long-term costs, and connect EU4Health more closely with EU objectives on productivity, competitiveness and social fairness.
